




MISSION ROAD: THE NUMBERS

People with Disabilities: Life Experiences and Feelings



Every person we serve has a primary diagnosis of IDD (Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities), characterized by significantly limited intellectual functioning and adaptive behaviors and includes severe, lifelong disabilities; and mental and/or physical impairments. IDD is a condition, not an illness, for which there aren't currently any cures.

We serve people who will never be able to live alone and will require specialized aid throughout their lifetime. Our oldest client is 89 and kicking! The 40 children who live in our campus cottages are all rescued from abusive and neglectful families; they are all wards of the state. MRDC is one of the few nonprofits providing services to lower-income families. 76% of our adult population has an annual income below \$5,000.

We are in the midst of a direct care staffing crisis exacerbated by the pandemic. We are diligently working on both recruiting efforts & implementing competitive benefit strategies to staff up to our goals allowing us to safely & fully reopen all of our programs.



Mission Road: What exactly do we do? Good question...!

We began serving children with special needs in 1947. Today, we offer residential & non-residential programs for children and adults diagnosed with IDD, Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. IDD is defined as having an IQ of 70 or below and includes Down Syndrome, Fragile X, Autism, Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, and hundreds of other diagnoses. 90%+ of the people we serve have secondary diagnoses and comorbidities. 60%+ are nonverbal. We help the people in our care achieve their goals through the implementation of Individual Treatment Plans.

We own and operate four children's and two adult cottages on our 22-acre main campus in south San Antonio. Our campus features a programming and recreation center, a covered pavilion and outdoor sports court, a medical clinic, laundry facility, commercial kitchen, ADA-accessible pool, air conditioned gym and four playgrounds. Our administration, maintenance facilities and staff are located on our main campus. We're one of only two nonprofits in Texas that offer long-term residential care for children 3 to 17 with IDD who've been removed from their homes by Child Protective Services due to abuse, neglect, or abandonment. We care for up to 40 children at a time.

We own and operate a second campus, Unicorn Centers, which includes a 31,000 sq. ft. facility near the medical center, and hosts an adult day activity program, job and life skills training center, and our community employment office. Throughout San Antonio, we own and manage 20 adult group homes and three adult semi-independent living apartment communities for 18+

year-olds. Residents are assisted by professional, 24-hour awake staff. Our supervised apartments are for adults who require minimal support. Four of our adult residences are for our HandsOn program and are home to 24 people diagnosed with IDD as well as Deaf/Blind/Multiply Disabled (DBMD).
